ROBERT KENDRICK, Orlando, FL (No. 143, Age: 26)

2006 US Open: Advanced through qualifying; l. to No.17 Andy Murray of Great Britain in the first round...

Reached second round at Wimbledon as a qualifier, pushing eventual finalist and world No. 2 Rafael Nadal to five sets in second round thriller... After Wimbledon, reached quarterfinals at Newport (l. to Murray)... Earlier in the year, won first singles title in nearly two years as a qualifier at \$50,000 Forest Hills in May (def. Mamiit in final)... Earned career-high No. 114 ranking in early 2004 after reaching first career ATP semifinal at San Jose (def. Taylor Dent, l. to Roddick)... Went 10-10 at USTA Challengers in 2005, reaching semifinals at \$50,000 Tallahassee (l. to Vahaly) and quarterfinals at \$50,000 Waikoloa and \$50,000 Dallas... Owns five career USTA Pro Circuit singles titles and 10 doubles titles.

AMER DELIC, Jacksonville, FL (No. 145, Age: 24)

2006 US Open: Lost in final round of qualifying to Benjamin Becker of Germany (who went on to defeat Andre Agassi en route to the fourth round)...

Earned wild card for 2006 Australian Open in USTA tournament in December and reached the second round (def. Starace of Italy in five sets in first round, l. to Healey of Australia)... Qualified at Indian Wells (l. to Marat Safin in first round)... Attempted to qualify at all four Grand Slams in 2005... Won Mexico City challenger in 2005 (def. Morrison in final)... In 2004, improved his year-end ranking more than 300 spots and finished his first full year as a pro ranked No. 170... Went 19-12 in Challengers in 2004, reaching two finals... Extended No. 3 Carlos Moya to four sets before losing in the second round of the 2004 US Open... **Turned pro after winning 2003 NCAA singles title as a junior at University of Illinois and helping Illini to its first team title.** Reached two finals at Challenger events this year at Lexington and Vancouver... Recently hired Dean Goldfine as his personal coach.

BOBBY REYNOLDS, Acworth, GA (No. 148, Age: 24)

2006 US Open: Lost in second round of qualifying to fellow American Robert Kendrick...

Playing primarily tour-level events in 2006, though he did reach the semifinals at Waikoloa, HI, Tallahassee, FL, and Leon, Mexico... Won the Indianapolis tour event doubles title with Andy Roddick... **Enjoyed a breakthrough year in 2005, improving nearly 200 spots to finish ranked No. 95 in the world... Earned \$47,265 on the USTA Pro Circuit to lead money list by over \$13,000... Breakthrough came at the 2005 Australian Open, where he won three matches to qualify, then reached the third round,** upsetting No. 17 seed Andrei Pavel in the second round before falling to Rafael Nadal of Spain... Excelled at the Challenger level in 2005, winning \$75,000 Nashville, Tenn., posting runner-up finishes at two others (\$50,000 Lexington, Ky., and \$50,000 Lubbock, Texas), and winning two doubles titles (\$50,000 Lexington, Ky., with Scoville Jenkins; and \$50,000 Calabasas, Calif., with Amer Delic)... **At the tour level, reached the quarterfinals at Washington D.C. and reached the doubles final at New Haven with Rajeev Ram...** Turned pro after his junior year at Vanderbilt where he finished the 2003 season ranked No. 1 after leading Vanderbilt to the team final (team lost, 4-3, but he defeated Delic at No. 1 singles)... Lives with Robby Ginepri in Atlanta.

JEFF MORRISON, Tampa, FL (No. 157, Age: 27)

2006 US Open: Advanced through qualifying (fourth time at a Grand Slam in his career); lost in first round to Bjorn Phau of Germany...

Former NCAA champion reached second round at Indian Wells as a qualifier (def. Pavel; l. to Monfils) and reached semifinals at Joplin, MO and Bronx, NY... In 2005, lost in first round of Roland Garros (to Berdych), qualified and lost in first round of Wimbledon (to Bjorkman) and attempted to qualify for US Open... Also in 2005, reached third round of ATP event in Miami as qualifier (l. to Stepanek) and reached semifinals of USTA Pro Circuit events in Lubbock (l. to Reynolds), Tulsa (l. to Dorsch), Calabasas (l. to Vahaly), Nashville (l. to Reynolds), and Champaign (l. to Udomchoke)... **Played for University of Florida from 1998-2000, winning 1999 NCAA singles title (def. James Blake of Harvard in final).**

MICHAEL RUSSELL, Ponte Vedra Beach, FL (No. 160, Age: 28)

2006 US Open: Qualified for the second time at US Open (and fifth Grand Slam in career); l. to No. 27 seed Gael Monfils of France in first round in four sets...

Won his 13th and 14th career USTA Pro Circuit singles titles at Brownsville, TX and Bronx, NY this year... Won two USTA Pro Circuit singles titles in three finals in 2005 (\$15,000 Arlington and \$50,000 Orlando as a qualifier; runner-up at \$15,000 McAllen, TX), bringing career total to 12, tied with Paul Goldstein for most all-time... **Became first player to qualify for four different Grand Slam events in succession** (2000 Wimbledon, US Open; 2001 Australian Open, Roland Garros)... **Made dramatic French Open debut in 2001,** saving match point in first round of qualifying and then reaching the fourth round of the main draw... Defeated former French Open champion Bruguera in second round (46 57 63, ret.) and Xavier Malisse in third round in his first five-set victory, then in fourth round on Center Court against No. 1 seed and defending champion Gustavo Kuerten, led two sets to love and held match point at 5-3 in the third set, before falling 36 46 76(3) 63 61 to the eventual champion in what would have been among the greatest upsets in Grand Slam tennis.

SAM QUERREY, Thousand Oaks, CA (No. 174, Age: 18)

2006 US Open: As wild card entrant, defeated Philipp Kohlschreiber of Germany in Grand Slam debut, then lost to No. 21 seed Gaston Gaudio of Argentina in second round...

The 6'6" teenager decided to turn pro in May and made his pro debut at Yuba City, CA and won the title... He also won a title at Winnetka, IL... Has made some noise at the Tour level, reaching the second round at Indian Wells, Newport, Indianapolis, Los Angeles and New Haven...has taken sets off of World No. 5 James Blake and World No. 2 Rafael Nadal... He also qualified at San Jose (l. to Spadea in first round) and lost in first round as a wild card at Las Vegas (to Vahaly) and Miami (to Bogomolov)... **Served as practice partner for U.S. Davis Cup team twice in the last year:** in

Belgium last September in the World Group Playoff, and last month in Rancho Mirage, Calif., for the 2006 Quarterfinal vs. Chile... In 2005, qualified for first career Challenger at \$75,000 Aptos, CA (l. to Ram in first round), reached first career pro final at \$15,000 Honolulu, HI (l. to Odesnik) and attempted to qualify for US Open as a wild card, and ATP event in Los Angeles...In doubles, made Grand Slam debut at 2005 US Open as a wild card w/ Donald Young (l. in first round) and qualified at \$75,000 Aptos w/ Jenkins (l. in first round)... In juniors, won USTA Spring International Championships and Easter Bowl in consecutive weeks and was runner-up to Donald Young at USTA Boys' 18s Nationals.

WAYNE ODESNIK, Weston, FL (No. 181, Age: 20)

2006 US Open: As a wild card entrant, lost in first round to Raemon Sluiter of the Netherlands...

Has won three times this year at a Challenger event in Milan, Italy and back-to-back weeks at Mobile, Alabama and Little Rock, Arkansas...Improved year-end ranking for fourth consecutive season in 2005...won Futures events in Waikoloa, Hawaii and Honolulu, Hawaii...had three runner-up finishes at Futures events in Mobile, Alabama; Auburn, California and Costa Mesa, California...qualified at ATP event in Indian Wells (l. to Verdasco in first round)...received a wild card into 2004 US Open (l. to Sanchez in first round)...won two Futures events in 2003 in Jamaica at Montego Bay...

JESSE WITTEN, Naples, FL (No. 189, Age: 23)

2006 US Open: Qualified to make Grand Slam debut; l. to Paul Goldstein in first round, coming back from two sets-to-noe deficit to force fifth set; match ended after midnight before over 500 fans on Court 4...

Began the year ranked outside the top 400, and cracked the top 200 within six months... Attempted to qualify at ATP events in Newport and Indianapolis and reached final round of qualifying at Wimbledon... **Currently leads the 2006 USTA Pro Circuit with three singles titles... Served as practice partner for U.S. Davis Cup team** in February during first round vs. Romania in La Jolla, Calif.... The following week won second USTA Pro Circuit title of the year at \$50,000 Joplin, MO (def. former Baylor standout Benjamin Becker in the final)... Also won \$10,000 Tampa, FL in January... Finished his collegiate career in spring 2005 as the **University of Kentucky's only five-time All-American** (four times in singles, once in doubles); he's one of only 11 players in college tennis history to be a four-time singles All-American. Finished the 2005 season with a 43-6 singles record and reached the quarterfinals at the NCAA Championships... Reached NCAA Final in 2002 as a freshman (l. to Matias Boeker of Georgia)... On the USTA Pro Circuit, Witten reached the final of three events in 2004, winning \$10,000 Joplin, MO and finishing runner-up at \$50,000 Lexington (l. to Boeker in 2002 NCAA Final rematch) and \$10,000 Peoria, IL.

ZACK FLEISHMAN, Playa Del Rey, CA (No. 197, Age: 26)

2006 US Open: Lost in second round of qualifying to Ivo Minar of the Czech Republic...

Won a challenger in Ho Chi Minh City, Vietnam in March, his sixth career Circuit singles title and reached the final at \$50,000 Tallahassee in April (l. to Fish)... Earlier in the year he qualified to make his Grand Slam debut at the Australian Open (l. to Dick Norman in first round)... Before Tallahassee this year, had reached six singles finals on USTA Pro Circuit, all in California (won \$15,000 Chico and \$15,000 Redding in 2000; finished runner-up at \$10,000 Laguna Niguel in 2005, \$50,000 Torrance in 2003, and \$15,000 Laguna and \$15,000 Fresno in 2002)... Attended UCLA in 1999 before turning pro... Ended 1998 ranked No. 2 nationally in USTA Boys' 18s after runner-up finish at USTA Boys' 18s Nationals that year.

ALEX BOGOMOLOV JR., Miami, FL (No. 204, Age: 23)

2006 US Open: Lost in first round of qualifying to Jean-Rene Lisnard of Monaco...

Reached second round at the Australian Open (def. Gonzalez of Chile 7-5 in fifth set; l. to Mathieu of France)... Also reached second round at NASDAQ-100 Open in Miami (def. Querrey; l. to Baghdatis)... Won singles and doubles titles (w/ Rettenmaier) at \$50,000 Tarzana, Calif., in 2005 and attempted to qualify for all three majors... He had previously qualified for the Australian Open two consecutive years, including in 2004, when he drew eventual champion Roger Federer in the first round... In December 2004, he married Ashley Harkelroad in a ceremony in Tennessee... He played a number of tour-level events in 2004, and had a steady presence throughout the US Open Series, losing to Andre Agassi in Los Angeles, Paradorn Srichaphan in Indianapolis, Carlos Moya in Toronto and Lleyton Hewitt in Cincinnati.

SAM WARBURG, Sacramento, CA (No. 238, Age: 23)

2006 US Open: Lost in first round of qualifying to fellow American Nikita Kryvonos...

Reached final at \$50,000 Yuba City, CA in June (l. to Querrey)... Won ATP debut at San Jose in February, defeating former US Open semifinalist Joachim Johansson before a packed hometown crowd... Back to back finalist at USTA Pro Circuit events in 2005, winning the title in Godfrey, IL and losing to Yani in Decatur, IL... Played four years at Stanford University, finishing with a 37-6 singles record, a 36-8 doubles record, the 2004 NCAA doubles championship, and a No. 2 college ranking... Warburg's win in Decatur last year helped launch his professional career, which now includes doubles victories, in Chico, CA (w/ Wurtzman) and Godfrey, IL (w/ Stolt).

PHILLIP SIMMONDS, Reston, VA (No. 240, Age: 20)

2006 US Open: As a wild card entrant, lost in first round to No. 25 seed Richard Gasquet of France...

Won first pro singles title in January at the \$10,000 USTA Pro Circuit men's Futures event in Boca Raton, Fla...followed that up with another win at the Challenger event in Leon, Mexico. Made first qualifying attempts at both Roland Garros and Wimbledon this year... Reached first pro final in October as a qualifier at a \$50,000 USTA Pro Circuit men's Challenger in Sacramento, Calif...Finished third at the 2004 USTA Boys' 18s Nationals and won the doubles title with Vahid Mirzadeh, earning the duo a wild card into the US Open... **Won 2003 Australian Open boys' doubles title with Scott Oudsema (def. world No. 1 duo of Florian Mergea and Horia Tecau in the final)** and reached the semifinals of the French Open and Wimbledon (both with Brian Baker)... Led U.S. to runner-up finish at 2002 Junior Davis Cup with Brendan Evans and Scott Oudsema, losing to Spanish team featuring Rafael Nadal.

NOTABLE NAMES AMONG THE ALTERNATES (Expected to compete in Qualifying):

SCOTT OUDSEMA, Kalamazoo, MI (No. 256, Age: 20)

2006 US Open: Lost in first round of qualifying to fellow American Jesse Witten...

Improved ranking by over 800 places since beginning of 2005... Posted first career-Challenger level win at Binghamton, NY...also reached the semifinals as a qualifier at \$50,000 Tunica, MS (l. to eventual champion Hartfield)... Earlier in the year, reached second career pro final at \$15,000 Little Rock, AR (l. to Odesnik)... In 2005, received wildcard to ATP event in Newport (l. to Ginepri in first round) and reached quarterfinals of USTA Pro Circuit events in Tarzana (l. to De Armas), Forest Hills grass (l. to Ram) and Auburn (l. to Jenkins)... In doubles, reached second round of US Open (w/ Kuznetsov)... **In 2004 he and Brendan Evans won three of the four Grand Slam boys doubles titles**, missing only the French Open, where they lost in the final... Reached the final of the 2004 USTA National Boys' 18s in his hometown of Kalamazoo, MI, losing to Scoville Jenkins... **In 2005, signed with Polo Ralph Lauren to represent the company's tennis brand in its advertising campaign.**

RAJEEV RAM, Carmel, IN (No. 264, Age: 22)

2006 US Open: Lost in first round of qualifying to fellow American Amer Delic...

Missed four months this season due to a wrist injury after reaching quarterfinals at Challengers in Dallas and Joplin in February... Attempted to qualify at Wimbledon... **In 2005, improved year-end ranking for fifth consecutive year...** Played best tennis in late June/July when he reached semifinals at \$50,000 Forest Hills, NY-Grass, final at \$75,000 Aptos (l. to Andy Murray), then third round at ATP event in Indianapolis in best Tour result to date (def. Schalken and Cakl; l. to Beck)... In August, reached quarterfinals at \$50,000 Binghamton, NY (l. to Bobby Reynolds), then with Reynolds, reached first ATP doubles final at New Haven, then lost in first round at US Open (to Wawrinka in five sets)... Played at University of Illinois for one semester (spring 2003)... **Helped Illini win first NCAA team title and posted program's first undefeated season (32-0)** and captured NCAA doubles crown w/ Brian Wilson.

ALEX KUZNETSOV, Richboro, PA (No. 269, Age: 19)

2006 US Open: As wild card entrant, lost in first round of No. 14 Tommy Haas of Germany...

Wild card recipient improved his ranking 130 places to career-high No. 279 after winning first career pro singles title at \$75,000 Aptos, CA as a wild card... Earlier this year, reached semifinals at \$10,000 Kissimmee, FL and \$15,000 Harlingen, TX... Reached the finals of USTA Pro Circuit events in Kissimmee, FL and Orange Park, FL in 2005 (l. to De Armas both times)... Could not play for two months after being in a car accident last summer; returned to tournament play at the US Open boys' event, reaching the third round (l. to Smyczek)... **The 2004 French Open boys' runner-up improved his ranking in 2004 from 1101 to 484. He also served as a practice partner on the U.S. Davis Cup team in 2004... He was ranked as high as No. 4 in the world junior rankings before turning pro in 2004.**

SCOVILLE JENKINS, Atlanta (No. 277, Age: 20)

2006 US Open: As wild card entrant, lost in first round to Jonas Bjorkman of Sweden...

Reached semifinals at \$50,000 Winnetka, Ill., earlier this year... Reached final round of qualifying at Wimbledon in his first attempt... Qualified at ATP event in Houston in April and reached second round (l. to Goldstein)... Also made first career qualifying attempt at Roland Garros this year... **Won first pro singles title at \$10,000 Kissimmee, FL in January** (def. Nunez in final)... **Ranking improved over 500 spots in 2005** (began year at No. 768)... **Reached second round of US Open as a wildcard** (def. Bastl in memorable first round five-setter, l. to No. 2 seed Nadal in nationally televised night match)... The week before the US Open, earned first career ATP Tour win at Pilot Pen Tennis in New Haven, upsetting Jarkko Nieminen before losing to Robredo... Reached quarterfinals at consecutive USTA Challengers (Aptos, Calif., and Lexington, Ky.)... Reached semifinals at \$15,000 Auburn (l. to Odesnik)... Reached first career pro semifinal in March at the Harlingen, TX Futures (l. to Newport)... **Jenkins received national media attention in August 2004 when he became the first African-American to win the USTA Boys' 18s National Hard Court singles championship at Kalamazoo in the event's 89-year history. His win earned him a wild card into the 2004 US Open, where he drew a night match in Arthur Ashe Stadium with defending champion Andy Roddick in the first round.**
